

ADULT-GERONTOLOGY ACUTE CARE CLINICAL NURSE SPECIALIST (DNP)

Graduates of the Adult-Gerontology Acute Care Clinical Nurse Specialist track use advanced skills to care for adults in increasingly complex acute and critical care settings. The curriculum focuses on three spheres of impact: patient care, nursing personnel, and the health care system.

Graduates of the track possess the core competencies to practice as a CNS for acute and critically ill adult patients in a variety of inpatient settings, including direct care, consultation, systems leadership, collaboration, research, ethical decision-making, and advocacy.
