

PEACE, JUSTICE AND CONFLICT STUDIES MINOR

The Peace, Justice and Conflict Studies minor is organized around a broad definition of peace, encompassing societal peace (including work to reduce violence and inequalities within the United States), international peace (focusing on ending wars, terrorist acts, unequal distribution of resources, and other infringements on human rights and dignity worldwide), and environmental peace (involving work on sustainable resources, global warming, and response to natural and human-made disasters). Students can enroll in internships classes and become involved with projects and program on campus focused on war and peace concerns, social justice, and environmental responsibility.

¹ Students may fulfill the general elective requirement by taking any two of the cross-listed courses in the three program areas of International Conflict and Peacemaking, Societal Violence and Conflict Resolution, and Environmental Violence and Ecological Concerns. In addition, students may choose to fulfill the general elective requirement by taking one of the three PAX Courses: PAX 390 Directed Readings in Peace Studies, PAX 397 Special Topics in Peace Studies, and PAX 398 Practicum in Peace Studies.

Suggested Sequence of Courses

An individual student's completion of requirements depends on course offerings in a given term as well as the start term for the minor. Students should consult the Peace, Justice, and Conflict Studies director for assistance with course selection.

- Demonstrate an ability to analyze, interpret, or describe two strategies of peacemaking.
- Interpret, analyze, and describe important contemporary of at least two global concerns (e.g., the environment, war, inequity and poverty, human rights).
- Demonstrate historical knowledge of some distinguished national and international leaders in peacemaking.
- Interpret and analyze and describe at least two global ecological concerns (e.g., the environment, war, inequity and poverty, human rights).
- Demonstrate an ability to analyze or describe the significance of the major core categories and discussions in the field of peace and justice studies.
